- Successfully completed Fall Semester with 1.6% increase in new students and flat credit hour production. See enrollment data below.
- Our new *Athens State Enrollment Center* temporarily located in the basement of McCain Hall. The Enrollment Center serves as a one stop service area for new and current students answering front line inquiries regarding the enrollment process, admissions steps, registration, financial aid and advising information. More detailed responses are just quick reach to the appropriate personnel for personalized services.
- Maintained our **Retention Success**. Mr. Derrek Smith reports our Fall Retention is unofficially at 74%. Thanks in part to our Retention Scholarship funding and the great faculty and staff support for continuing students.

WE ARE...

- Finalizing our 2018-19 re-designed **Scholarship Program**. The re-design includes a "no application" process with additional funding for scholarships totaling \$1,080,000 in the 2018-19 budget year. Our goal is to allow us to be more competitive with area Regional Universities and acknowledge the distinct non-traditional students we serve with demonstrated academic success and demonstrated need.
- Kicking off the spring registration cycle with a New Student Transfer Day October 31, 2017. Our supporting communication plan is designed to touch each current student at least once in the Spring cycle in addition to encouraging prospective students through the enrollment pipeline. Spring 2018 registration begins on November 1st.

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

WE HAVE...

• Been awarded \$1,000,000 in grant funds for a Houston Hall replacement facility over the flat root and mechanical space. PH&J is assisting in the development of a plan for the space that will allow for technological advancements for the University.

WE ARE...

- Re-roofing the Sandridge Student Center and the Classroom Building and expect those projects to be completed within the next two months.
- Working with our auditors, CDPA, to complete our audit for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2017 and expect to have the audit report ready for the January 2018 Board meeting.

WE WILL...

- Begin paving projects to include AMSTI, Chasteen Hall, College Street Center and the new circular drive in front of the Sandridge Student Center.
- Be clearly identifying and repainting all handicap parking spaces.
- Begin renovation on the Sandridge Student Center interior within the next month. Once the Alabama Building Commission signs off on occupancy of the temporary office space, all student services areas will be relocated.



UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT

WE HAVE...

• Hosted the 51st annual Fiddlers Convention. Total ticket revenue for the convention was in excess of \$140,000.

WE ARE...

• In the process of finalizing a Bicentennial Committee, which will oversee planning and organizing events for our 200th anniversary in 2022. Dr. Robert Burkhardt has agreed to serve as a co-chair for the Bicentennial Committee. Dr. Burkhardt will also work with Sara Love on updating the history of the University.

WE WILL...

- Be concluding the 9th Annual Fall Phonathon on November 14, 2017. We have set an ambitious goal of \$50,000 this year, which represents a 50% increase over last year. To-date, we have just over \$16,000 in gifts and pledges, which is approximately 38% ahead of last year at this same time. Proceeds from the Phonathon provide scholarships for students in need of a helping hand and to fund other needs identified as critical to student success.
- Be convening the Board of Trustees Development Committee for the first time today. The committee is composed of alumni, trustees, representatives from the Foundation Board and Board of Visitors, faculty and staff designees, and community members. The committee will provide oversight for our fundraising operations while serving as liaisons between the University and our various constituencies.

TECHNOLOGY SERVICES....

- Installed the new, 44 TB, solid state disk (SSD) array the last week of September 2017. Going to solid state drives increases speed, has lower maintenance costs amounting in \$144,987 over the next 7 year period. The SSD array will provide a consolidated storage solution for the data center with a high level of reliability.
- Began working on the QuickLaunch single sign-on solution
 - QuickLaunch will be a great improvement for student, faculty, and staff access to all services that currently use individual login methods.
- Planning the implementation of Banner 9 (XE). Banner 9 will be a major change in the ERP system affecting Finance, HR, Payroll, Student, and Financial Aid.
- Began centrally procuring/managing faculty and staff desktop computer replacements
- Received funding to upgrade perimeter firewalls
- Are finalizing the specifications to upgrade the Blade Center and install load balancers

THE ACADEMIC TECHNOLOGY SERVICES (ATS)

- Continues work on Quality Matters (QM) online course design
 The QM initiative continues in ATS. The request for proposals issued by the Provost will provide a new set of courses and faculty to follow the QM standards.
- Will expand services for the Quality Matter initiative

 A new designer and developer will be added this fall to work directly with faculty to develop online courses.
- The ATS team is nearing the final implementation phase of DocSoft, the transcription and closed captioning tool, by integrating it with Tegrity, the online video capture/access tool.
- ATS has installed the accessibility monitoring tool Ally in Blackboard
