There are 5 classes that you can take **PRIOR** to being admitted into the Teacher Education Program (TEP) in the College of Education. These are the classes you should take **FIRST**.

These 5 classes (15 hours) are:

1. ED 301 Foundations of Education I
2. ED 302 Foundations of Education II
3. ED 305 Technology and Media in Education
4. SE 301 Introduction to Exceptional Learners
5. PS 334 Adolescent Psychology

You **CANNOT** take ED 301 and ED 302 the same semester; these 2 classes need to be sequenced (for example: take ED 301 in the fall, ED 302 in the spring). You need to take these 5 classes over the course of 2 semesters in addition to taking courses in the content area in which you wish to teach. Once you have been admitted into the program, you can then (and only then) sign up for the 4 TEP courses. **AGAIN**, you should only take the classes listed below **AFTER** you have been admitted into the teacher education program.

These 4 TEP classes (12 hours) are:

1. SC 331 Classroom Management in Secondary Education
2. SC 333 Teaching Reading and Writing in Content Areas
3. SC 362 Assessment and Evaluation in Secondary Education
4. Methods Materials and Methods of Teaching* (see list below for your class)

Biology: BI 456
 English: EH 457
 General Science: GS 456
 History: HY 450
 Math: MA 454
 Social Science: SS 450

You can only sign up for these four TEP classes (SC 331, SC 333, SC 362, methods) once you have gone through the TEP process and have been admitted. You need to take your "methods" course the semester before student teaching, if possible.

NOTE ABOUT STUDENTS WHO ALREADY HAVE A DEGREE: You must meet all general education, professional education, and certification class requirements.

Once you have completed all of your course work, you are ready to register for student teaching.

This class (9 hours) is:

1. SC 486 Internship in High School Education

Apply the **Spring Semester prior to the school year that you plan to intern**. There is no application available during the Fall Semester or Summer Semester.

OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION:

I. TESTING INFO

1. A requirement for getting admitted into the Teacher Education Programs (TEP) is the Alabama Prospective Teacher Test (APTT). You need to take this test your **first semester** enrolled at ASU. There are 3 parts to this test: math, reading, and writing. You are required to take and pass all sections. Go to www.act.org/alabamaptt to sign up for this **REQUIRED** test.

2. Every student is required to pass a test in their content area (i.e. what you want to teach). A passing score on this test is required for student teaching and certification in the state of Alabama. You need to take this test your **first semester** enrolled at ASU. Without a passing score on your Praxis II test, you cannot student teach or be certified in Alabama. Go to www.ets.org/praxis to sign up for this **REQUIRED** test.

For both the APTT and Praxis II, you need to enter the codes "1024" for Athens State University and "7020" for the Alabama Department of Education when they ask you where you want your scores to be sent.

II. TEP ADMISSION/ADVISING/FINGERPRINTING

REQUIREMENTS to be admitted into the TEP:

1. GPA Requirements for Arts & Science (Secondary Majors): Overall Cumulative GPA 2.5, Professional Courses GPA 2.5, Courses for Certification 2.75
2. General Education Courses and Major Prerequisites (Pre-Professional) Courses completed and all transcripts must be on file with the Records Office and must appear on the ASU transcript in Banner.
3. Course Requirements: Completion of 2 professional education and 2 teaching field courses. NOTE: ED 301 must be completed with a grade of "C" or higher.
4. Alabama Prospective Teacher Testing Program (APTTP): completed and received a passing score in all 3 areas.

5. Fingerprinting: completed and cleared.
6. TB Test: negative TB test results must be on file in the Certification Office.
7. TEP interview: Students must complete an interview scheduled through their advisor.
8. LiveText Portfolio Review: Student's LiveText portfolio will be evaluated by their advisor.
9. Receive the approval of the faculty of the College of Education.

2. ADVISING: You have **two advisors**: one in secondary education (**based on your major**) and one in your subject field. Contact the College of Arts and Sciences for your SUBJECT ADVISOR if you don't already have one. The role of your **subject advisor** is to guide you through your subject matter coursework and answer any questions related to transfer credit. The role of your secondary **education advisor** is to guide you through your education coursework and the TEP process. **Barry Devine**, in the Athens State Transfer Center, evaluates your transcripts for general education coursework upon entry to the university. As a student, it is extremely important that you know the role(s) of these 3 contacts.

For admission into TEP, your **CONTENT/SUBJECT ADVISOR** will prepare and evaluate your plan of study; your secondary **EDUCATION ADVISOR** will assess your portfolio and conduct your interview. See list below for secondary education advisors by subject area:

3. FINGERPRINTING will no longer be done at Athens State University. The Cogent Agency is now responsible for all ABI/FBI clearance. Please go to: www.cogentid.com/AL or www.cogentid.com/alabama for more information on fingerprinting.

III. FIELD EXPERIENCE

1. EVERY course in College of Education has a FIELD EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENT. Go to http://www.athens.edu/college_edu/Field%20Experiences/FieldMain.php for more information. This means that NO CLASS in the COLLEGE OF EDUCATION is completely ONLINE. You are required to do work in the schools for every class during Field Experience.

2. You are required to do 3 days of field experience per class in secondary education and 5 days for your methods class. Given this requirement, it is not a good idea to take all of your education classes in the same term. In the past, the number of days has been capped at 10 days per semester. This is no longer the case. If you decide to take 5 classes, then you will have to complete 15 days of field experience. To avoid this type of situation, spread your education classes out over several semesters instead of taking all of them during one semester (Policy as of Fall 2009).

IV. CATALOG

1. For all guidelines and requirements for your specific degree program, FOLLOW THE GUIDELINES IN THE ASU CATALOG. For all classes, requirements, rules, etc. you should follow the catalog from the semester that you entered Athens State University. You can obtain a catalog from the admissions office OR see the online catalog on the ASU website.

2. Since all programs of study that lead to certification in the state of Alabama are subject to change depending on the State Department of Education guidelines, make sure you are following the guidelines in your catalog (i.e. the semester/year you first enrolled at ASU).
